


## The Enford Community Fund


Funding is available to help projects/events in the Parish of Enford (which includes East and West Chisenbury, Coombe, Fiffield and Littlecott).

The following guidelines will be followed in allocating funds:


- 1. Awards will be considered every 6 months in March and September.

## Love Reading, Love Libraries Mobile Library Service Wiltshire Council

The mobile library visits Enford, Water Lane every four weeks on a Friday 3.45 – 4.10pm.

For adults, there is a large range of information, books and novels, ranging from the latest thriller to best-selling autobiographies, cookery and gardening. There is also a wide selection of large print and talking books.

If you are a parent with young children, you will find a great range of picture books and story CDs for them to enjoy; there are information books and plenty of exciting reading for older children as well.

There is access to the whole county stock through the Wiltshire Libraries online catalogue. Books, audio books and DVDs can be requested on the mobile or online and collected by customers from the mobile library. All children's stock can be requested free of charge with a small fee for adult requests. You can also use your membership card at any Wiltshire library and return books to the mobile library.

- It is free to join and there are no fines for overdue books on the mobile library.
- It's easy to join, just bring along proof of your name and address and the friendly Mobile Manager will sign you up straight away – they are always happy to help.
- The mobile has full accessibility and is fitted with a customer lift.

## Peggy Waterkeyn (1921-2019) <u>A Life of Adventure</u>

The death of Peggy in October is a great loss to all who knew her. She died in her cottage in Coombe after a number of years of illness.

Peggy Enjoying a Party in Enford

Many will remember her as a friendly, quiet, retired lady with a great sense of humour but few know of her exciting early life before she came to live in Coombe.

Her father was Belgian but Peggy was born in London and went to a convent school in Wimbledon. At the age of 7 her family moved to Brussels and so she very quickly had to learn French ready for her new school. When the war broke out in 1939 she was 18 and as the German Army invaded the family fled to Ostend. With the German planes bombing the town her father managed to get them aboard the last ferry to England. It was a near run thing.

Aged 19 Peggy was the first to admit she had few obvious skills other than French and short-hand but she was eager to play a full part in defeating Hitler. So she joined the WAAF (Women's Auxiliary Air Force) and trained at radio school. Photographs of her in uniform show a very attractive young woman who could easily be mistaken for a Hollywood movie star.

She was posted to one of the secret radar stations on the east coast to plot plane movements over the North Sea and Channel. She was soon chosen for officer training and served at a number of stations. It could be dangerous. One night a German bomb exploded outside the hut, shattering the door and blowing all the papers across the room.

Demobbed in 1945 Peggy worked for a short time in the British Embassy in Belgium as an assistant social secretary. Winston Churchill visited and at a reception in his honour she was presented to him. In front of her was the Papal Nuncio who held out his hand and offered Winston the apostolic handshake. Winston, who had fully enjoyed the Embassy hospitality, dropped cigar ash over the Nuncio's hand. He quickly apologised and to Peggy's amusement, said with a laugh: 'a l'eternite' (see you in the next life).

Returning to England Peggy worked for the British Film Academy (the forerunner of BAFTA). Her job was to get film and TV makers together to view each others' work and then to nominate films for awards. She did this for eight years. By then her parents were getting on and they bought a cottage in Coombe. So Peggy left London and came to live with them.

## A Quieter Life.

Many still remember when she worked as a receptionist in the surgery in Pewsey. After her parents died she lived alone with her cat. She had many good friends and all of us will miss her generous nature. Her Christian faith was at the heart of her life and well into her nineties she would drive her old battered car into Amesbury to attend Mass.

Peggy, thank you for your friendship. We will miss you. (Max Peberdy, Coombe).



## Enford Village Hall Management Committee



We are very pleased that, at long last, we have had the car park lighting system replaced!! New underground cabling with new bollards and drive over lights – and more of them!



We have also installed a floodlight on the pole we had installed a while ago. With the new system we can isolate each light unit individually so if there is a problem it will not affect all the others.

It has been a very expensive upgrade and installation – just over  $\pounds 9,000$ . It has been necessary as, unfortunately, the original installation when the hall was built proved to be below standard. Hence we have been having problems for the past three or four years with various

expensive repairs and patch ups. In the end the committee made the decision that it would be more cost effective to bite the bullet and install new waterproof underground cabling and underground waterproof

connectors, with replacement LED lights which give out more light at less cost, and at the same time install more units. Hopefully a win, win situation!

We need to do some fund raising to refill our capital reserve fund and donations would be very welcome! We have been very lucky that the Enford Community Fund has kindly contributed £500 towards the cost, and the Tidworth Area Board awarded a grant of £1,500. A bridge drive raised £800 but we need a further £6,200 if at all possible. Any ideas for fund raising would be great and we will organise another bridge drive in the spring.

#### 19/132 MOD/Army Matters

The Clerk read out WO2 Jeff Payne's report for October: 80x Near Misses-vehicles 69, on foot 9, Cyclists1and horses1.

18x Fly-tipping; 3x Environmental - 2x chemical spillages and 1x fire 4x Criminal Damage

2x complaints – 1x noise and 1x reporting of nuisance vehicles on area 2x Livestock – cattle loose 11 6x Accidents – all military

Additionally: -The centre range closes for Winter maintenance after 1700hrs on 13<sup>th</sup> December and reopens at 0830hrs on 3<sup>rd</sup> January 2020.

-The MOD Police telephone number to call is **01371 854444.** This number to be used to report crimes on the Plain rather than going through 101.

-Week commencing 25<sup>th</sup> November will be busy for Artillery – 3x Regiments live firing (Tuesday and Thursday up to 2330hrs)

#### 19/137 Matters Arising

i.Installation of new Salt Bin at the top of Fifield Lane. - The Clerk reported that after 8 months since confirming the order with the Contractor, we now have permission to proceed. This should appear in the next two weeks.

ii.Land Asset Transfer from Wiltshire Council. - Cllr Cliffe-Roberts reported that he was waiting for a response from Jenny Row, Estates Manager at WC. If, as thought, the 'giff' of 3x freehold strips of land along the A345 were a 'package' with getting the extended. leased Playpark area, then the Parish Council would decline the transfer. If the lease for the extended Playpark area was independent of this, the Parish Council would proceed. The Clerk read out an email from a resident suggesting the cost of maintaining the freehold strips of land on the A345 was a bad deal for the parish and should not be considered. Cllr Roberts raised the issue of whether the parish actually needed the Playpark extension at all and a discussion was had regarding the fact that children don't 'go out to play' as much as they used to, there are fewer children in the Parish, the equipment in place is aimed at younger children who need parental supervision and there is nothing available (apart from the basketball hoop) for children of age 10+. A balance of equipment should be addressed to cover a greater age range. It was agreed to wait for W.C.'s decision before proceeding with anything. The break clause (as it is unlikely to be used) could be accepted but if all the pieces of land are a 'package' then the Parish Council would decline the offer.

ii. The purchase of a village Christmas Tree. – This was agreed by all Cllrs, the tree should be around 3 metres in height and should not be put up until early December. Cllr Roberts has the lights from last year but would require more batteries.

iv.Parish gardening requirements for December, January and February. It was agreed, as in previous years, to ask the Garden Services to stand down for three months.

v.Tidworth Area Board (TAB) extended update slot. – ClIr Roberts explained that this was an opportunity for Parish Councils to put forward to the TAB the most pressing issues with which they need to deal. The next TAB meeting is being held on 25<sup>th</sup> November. There followed a discussion on flooding, the breaking up of road surfaces. The Environment Agency's alerts/warnings are currently not listing anything for Enford however the sustained and widespread rain in October following a similarly wet September has resulted in saturated soils. Rivers rose because of the 'above normal' rainfall with less storage capacity in the soils. Groundwater levels have been recorded as 'normal' or higher despite the exceptionally dry summer and last winter, with three monitoring sites 'exceptionally high' for the time of year and this could add to problems when the winterbournes start to appear. ClIr Hiskett suggested speeding as a perennial problem on the A345 as well as the C32 with the former being one of the north/south transit routes through the County. The size of the lorries is of concern as signs are constantly being

'bashed' and verges are already eroding. It was agreed flooding and traffic were the two main issues.

vi.Cllr Cliffe-Roberts brought the date of the Parish Hall Management Committee's AGM to everyone's attention. It will be held on Wednesday 27<sup>th</sup> November at 7.30pm in the Church. All residents are welcome to attend.

vii. The Clerk raised the matter of a Parish Council only website for Parish Council documents to act as an archive as well as a 'go to' site for information. Currently the PC has its own section on the Newsletter website which does comply with the Transparency Laws that came into effect in July '18. There are now more compliance laws - web content accessibility guidelines (WCAG 2.1) requirements which are already in place, depending on the age of the site and it would be easier to enforce this with a new PC site than make changes to the Newsletter website. This can be done free of charge through Google so no hosting costs. The Council all felt this was a good idea and the Clerk will start to work on this.

#### 19/141 The Parish Hall

Cllr Cliffe-Roberts as Chairman of the PHMC reported that they were waiting for the Method Statement from the demolition company which then needs to be forwarded to Wiltshire Council along with the Asbestos Report before 'pressing the green button'. The demolition is unlikely to take place before the new year and all neighbours would be informed before the event. The Councillors were asked for their approval to pay the agreed cost of £7.000 which would be in the form of a loan to the PHMC. All Clirs agreed.

#### 19/142 Roads and Highways

Cllr Coulthard had sent a brief report to say that the Parish Steward had been tasked with trimming around all the salt bins and dog mess bins to ensure ease of access. With regard to flooding issues, WC had been called to inspect but by the time they came out (a couple of days later) all the water had disappeared. At the recent meeting of the Community Area Transport Group (CATG) he had asked about the freehold strips of land available from WC. It was confirmed that the cost of maintenance would be down to Enford PC and recommended that EPC request a maintenance inspection/clearance before any 'hand over' of land. Should the PC consider additional purchases of a Speed Indicator Device (SID), personnel from CATG would first come out to inspect the area concerned (C32). A discussion was had and it was agreed to look out and purchase 20mph signs as a deterrent.

#### 19/143 Public Rights of Way (PRoWs)

Cllr Hiskett reported that the Avon Valley Group/Paths for All project had had 2 meetings recently and envisage 4 walks initially. These will be 'walked', photographed and documented and the information will be printed as a tri-fold brochure for general distribution. Netheravon School will be responsible for doing the graphics for a 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> mile walk around their location. To date two kissing gates have been installed (at Corfe End Lakes and B/B1 crossing) and a further two gates are planned. These have been funded by Wiltshire Council. 19/144 Correspondence

Cllr Roberts read out an email from a resident regarding potential flooding by a precarious looking tree, south of Enford Bridge – his concern is, should this tree fall into the river thus blocking the natural flow, this could cause 'backing up' and possible flooding into the village. Cllr Waight who rents the land from the MOD will consult with Landmarc, it is side of the bridge which are of equal concern.

Regarding flooding in the village, Cllr Roberts wanted to remind everyone that it is the houseowner's responsibility to protect their property, not Wiltshire Council's.

#### 19/145 Any Other Business

-Cllr Holdway asked about the Code of Conduct complaint. Unfortunately this had gone to Review and was still a confidential matter. As and when allowed by Wiltshire Council, the Cllrs would be informed.


This image represents the bins available for bagged dog mess in the village.
