

Don't delay seeking medical help because of Coronavirus

People living in Wiltshire are being advised not to let worries about coronavirus stop them asking for medical help for themselves or their children if they become ill, have a serious accident or have a concern about their health.

They are also being warned that not seeking medical help for symptoms that could be the early warning signs of serious conditions such as cancer could be putting lives at risk.

The warning comes as new data shows a considerable drop in the number of people coming forward to ask their GP for help and advice during the coronavirus outbreak.

Dr Ruth Grabham, Medical Director at BaNES, Swindon and Wiltshire CCG, said the statistics made for worrying reading because the drop in numbers "is not because people are not experiencing symptoms."

"While it may seem that coronavirus has put a stop to most aspects of everyday life, the one thing it hasn't stopped is what's going on inside our bodies," she says. "Now more than ever, we need to pay attention to anything that isn't normal and seek help early on.

For example, if you notice blood when going to the toilet, or if you've found a lump that wasn't there previously, or if you've just noticed something odd that is causing you to worry, you need to speak to your GP.

Should the symptom be the early warning sign of something serious like cancer, that delay in seeking help could have serious implications for how successful possible treatments may be."

Emergency departments are at three hospitals in Bath, Swindon and Salisbury, all of which continue to be open 24 hours a day for people with a genuine and life-threatening health concern.

Additionally, all healthcare facilities in the region, have put in place stringent infection control measures to ensure that the risk of contracting coronavirus while visiting a hospital or GP surgery remains low.

I don't anticipate having to call on anyone immediately but in the more distant future, this may be necessary. At least we are prepared.

A bible verse that many of you will know is appropriate for us always but particularly now at this time.


Look after each other, look out for each other, and be assured that God is watching over all of us.

Wiltshire Council has launched a reward campaign to reduce fly-tipping throughout the county. They are urging anyone with any information about fly-tipping in Wiltshire to report it to them with as much information as possible, and any successful prosecution will earn a voucher of up to £200 for the person who reported it.

IMPORTANT: Do not try to rummage through or disturb the waste, as this could affect the scene and put people in danger. It is also essential that people do not attempt to confront anyone who is fly-tipping or put themselves in danger in any way.

Coombe-unity spirit in COVID

What do an Australian soap, Covid and Coombe have in common? For me, it's the reminder that "Everybody needs good neighbours"! The way in which residents of Coombe (where I am) and in the nearby villages have come together during the crisis whilst staying apart has been a pleasure to see and hear. The merry din around the valley on a Thursday evening is something I'll never forget!

A village is society in miniature: good, bad and sometimes ugly. There have been some disappointments during these times, from fly tipping, to social media spats, to police having to break up clusters of people. However, all in all, we've made very many silver linings to an otherwise difficult time. Humour helps, and there's been lots of it doing the rounds. I'm amazed that the number of funny videos being circulated on WhatsApp hasn't crashed our fragile broadband in Coombe! Things like this go a little way to lightening the load for those who are ill, worried or feeling down.

Creativity has thrived, for those lucky enough to have a bit more time. I didn't consider myself a creative person until now, but a highlight of my lockdown has been a weekly email quiz and challenge with some local friends. Having just recreated a famous album cover for last week's quiz, my partner and I are now working on a rendition of a Beatles song with new COVID lyrics. I'm not sure it's going to rival the original but we'll give it our best shot! So many other examples exist too, such as front-garden opera singers on a Thursday and the beautiful NHS mural in Netheravon. Our community has become a cultural hub!

Nature has been our alternative medicine, and we're lucky to have so much of it here. The sun has shone, the lambs are springing, and the views we have during our once-daily outings have been spectacular. Have you noticed how much more often people out and about are smiling and waving and stopping for a quick (socially-distanced chat)? Nature is also playing its part! I hope that even those quarantined at home have been able to appreciate the bird song and flowers.

Kindness – however - has been the greatest pleasure of all. I feel like we've returned in some ways to the good old days, when people knew their neighbours and looked out for them. The number of local people volunteering on the NHS app is so high that they're mostly twiddling their thumbs; but people are doing all sorts of good deeds, like sewing masks, shopping for those that can't, and checking to see they're OK.

In Coombe, I've got to know those around me better, and we've actually had fun. We know we can rely on each other, and that we can ask for help if we need it. We've also created new traditions, like Easter Day drinks and music in the street (I brought out my violin after a 20-year break)! Time flew, and we've promised to do it next year, hopefully minus the 2-metre distance. The thing is, I hope that this time next year we will still be good neighbours, and will have kept up our humour, creativity, appreciation of nature and most of all, our kindness. Well done everyone, and let's keep that community spirit ringing around the valley!

We work with County Police Forces to help reduce crime in our communities and to protect vulnerable individuals. Crimestoppers nationally runs a large number of campaigns each year educating the public about different crime types and appealing for information. The national website is www.crimestoppers-uk.org, should you want to find out more.

In Wiltshire, we are trying to increase our reach to the public with a number of initiatives to make our communities more aware of our service and encourage its use. We are also looking for volunteer 'Ambassadors' within individual parishes to help us stay aware of local issues and promote the use of the service.

Public reporting of crime and anti-social behaviour using 999 or 101 is sometimes inhibited through fear of identification, and thus also of recrimination or reprisal. In providing a 100%-quaranteed anonymous reporting system through Crimestoppers using the number 0800 555 111, we hope to overcome those fears and thus make our communities safer for all. In the last year alone, anonymous reports of crime to Crimestoppers in our county have led to a number of convictions.

One of our objectives this year is to make more people in Wiltshire, especially the more vulnerable members of our communities, aware of the Crimestoppers reporting service through the parish magazines of the County. We hope, for example, to keep the Crimestoppers logo and contact details constantly in the public eye through regular placements in publications such as these.

Finally, as a volunteer Committee we are always looking for people to help our cause and kindly give us their time to make our communities safer; if you know of anyone who may be interested please do let me know.

End of life specialists launch appeal for support during Covid-19 pandemic

The Coronavirus pandemic has affected the nation in different ways but one area that has been hit harder than most is the charity sector.

For local charity Prospect Hospice, demand for services is increasing while, at the same time, vital funding dried up overnight. The charity continues to deliver essential specialist end of life care to local people, but is now struggling to find the funds to do this.

To combat this, the charity is launching an appeal to raise £2million to ensure its crucial services continue during this time and in the months and years to come. Irene Watkins, chief executive of Prospect Hospice, said: "The hospice is still supporting this community, but to respond to the current needs for Covid-19 we have had to dramatically change and increase the size and scope of our services.

"This means we are supporting people in their homes on a scale of operation we have never attempted before, we've re-deployed staff to ensure that our skills are used in the best possible way and we've invested heavily in PPE to protect our key workers, our patients and their families."

As a local independent charity, Prospect Hospice depends on nearly three quarters of its income to come from local people but since the end of March, many fundraising events have needed to be cancelled and all hospice shops have closed meaning the traditional ways people used to support the hospice are no longer available.

Talking about funding of the hospice at this time, Ms Watkins said: "As you'd expect, we have cut costs wherever we can, and the Government recently committed £200 million to support hospices across the country. From this Prospect Hospice has received an allocation of £341,000, which we welcome, however, in the current climate, we calculate that over the coming six months the shortfall from lost income will mean that we will still need to raise a further £2 million to deliver the hospice service. This I know is a big number but we simply must raise it."

Care from the hospice is delivered free of charge to patients in the Swindon and north east Wiltshire area but the hospice incurs large costs in order to do this and, during the Covid-19 period, it is costing the hospice £17,197 a day to run all of its services.

Broken down, it costs around £26 per day to fuel a nurses car so they can visit patients in their own homes, around £177 will pay for all of the specialist medical supplies and equipment that we need to care for a patient, and the average cost of a single person cared for at this time is around £601.

Prospect Hospice has been part of the local community for 40 years but it now needs your help to be here for the next 40.

A Taste of South America Episode 4

You join us as we leave via boat for our final Galapagos destination of Santa Cruz. The boat trip was one I'll never forget. The swell was only about 2-2.5metres, but unfortunately the current and wind were all coming from different directions causing us to have a rather bumpy ride! Knowing how unpleasant this journey was going to be, with a few likely to succumb to sea sickness and against Dallas's advice I decided to



sit on the top deck for this journey. Although it was scary at times I had a blast, laughing in hysterics each time we hit a wave and I got drenched, the captain looking back at me, possibly thinking I was slightly crazy! A much better, more exciting trip than those feeling so ill below!



Santa Cruz is the most central of the Galapagos Islands and is home to the largest population of 16,000 people. It's definitely the most commercial and probably the least favourite island we visited. There were lots of souvenir shops, restaurants, pubs, even complete with a bright green caterpillar train that goes along the pier front; Blackpool at its best. It has fewer accessible sandy beaches for swimming and snorkelling and we saw fewer animals here.

Whilst on Santa Cruz we visited the Charles Darwin research centre. It contains much of research his work, exhibitions of past and present projects and a larger Giant Tortoise breeding centre.

Dallas went for a half day's dive seeing white and black tipped reef sharks, Galapagos sharks, lots of big schools of fish including snapper and big Eagle rays. Whilst he did so I went on a trip to see some underground lava tunnels. Inside, the tunnels, which you can walk through, are around



30metres long. We were lucky enough to see the 2 species of owl on the island, the barn and short ear owl. I then went to an island farm. We saw and got to make and taste cane sugar alcohol, locally grown coffee and did a walk where I was able to see Giant Tortoises living in the wild. A real highlight for me especially with the amount I saw too.

Unfortunately this was the final day of our Galapagos trip, an experience we shall never forget. My favourite island was Isabella, for the wildlife I got to see, swimming with the turtles and penguins and snorkelling through the lava tubes; also hiking the Volcano, the vast differing landscape and formations. My one special memory will be how all the animals were so comfortable with our presence, just going naturally about their everyday life, especially the Blue Footed Boobies standing over the nest, their eggs underneath. For Dallas his favourite island was also Isabella, for the variety of wildlife we saw and activities we did, lots of snorkelling and kayaking. His standout moment was snorkelling with the sharks, turtles and sea lions.

My only disappointment on the islands was the amount of rubbish littering the streets and bushes and unnecessary use of plastic. For islands where reducing the amount of plastic, conservation and the environment is so important single use plastic seems to be more commonly used. Individual wrapped apples in the supermarket, single soap bar and

shampoo sachets in some hotels and plastic bin liners in bins, changed every day due to dirty toilet paper. There are a lot of efforts in place to change these and fingers crossed it happens soon.

We are now going out for a meal before starting the next part of our adventure. Both excitement and nervous.

Now for the start of our Peruvian adventure. We left Ecuador and flew to Peru's capital Lima.

Lima is home to 8.6million people, nearly one third of Peru's total population. The earthquake in 1746 destroyed all but 20 houses and killed 4,000 inhabitants. Today Lima is seriously affected by chaotic traffic, smog and is surrounded by poor neighbourhoods, something that became apparent on our arrival.

Arriving at 10.45pm it took us an hour to clear immigration. Thankfully we already had our transfer booked, as the airport and queues for taxis were chaos. Once inside the taxi we were given a sign to read stating all luggage must either be locked in the boot or kept under your seat. This was due to opportunists opening doors or leaning through windows to steal bags and luggage and with the number of people milling around, despite it being past midnight, it seemed a likely possibility! The areas outside the airport I would definitely refer to as 'the Bronx'. A high police presence, flashing lights, lots of cars and driving in more lanes the road was designed for! It certainly had me wondering what type of country we would be spending the next 2 weeks in! Thankfully the area we were staying, Miraflores in the southern suburbs, looked more inviting; much cleaner and tidier with numerous hotels, restaurants and less intimidating night life.

On our first day in Peru, Dallas and I explored the local area. The city felt quite cosmopolitan with high-rise buildings next to busy roads and adjacent to this tree-lined cobbled streets. There were large sporting areas running parallel to the road with tennis courts, gyms, swimming pools; all open air with terraced seating.





About a 20min walk out of a town was a beach. All the beaches in Lima, despite being declared as unsuitable for swimming, are still very much part of the culture with many locals swimming.

We also visited Kennedy Park, a well-kept park which has an open air theatre and arts and crafts markets most evenings.

While walking through the park, which is surrounded on all sides by busy roads, we noticed a cat sleeping under one of the trees. Then spotted one up a tree, one under a bench, another sleeping on the grass and so it went on. We later discovered the park is now home to many stray







cats and was previously a well-known area for abandoning unwanted sick or injured cats. An organisation now looks after the 'park cats' ensuring they are fed and watered daily, neutered and every Sunday is adoption day, where thankfully strict criteria must be met to be eligible to rehome a cat. On the whole, the cats look fairly healthy and seem to be happy and relaxed living in the park, climbing trees.

Later that afternoon we caught a bus into town for an orientation tour, visiting the colonial centre, seeing its historic architectural buildings with rich gilded wooden balconies.

It makes things very unpleasant for walkers, bikers, joggers, families etc.




