Update 24 September 2020

NHS Test and Tracelt is a <u>legal requirement</u> to collect customer data, to support NHS Test and Trace.

- From Thursday 24 September, all gyms and leisure venues in England must display an NHS QR code, and collect customer data to support NHS Test and Trace.
- If you deliver classes in a venue, please ensure that the venue is displaying a QR code. If it is not, you should provide one for your class.
- For children's classes, parents should scan the QR code.
- If you deliver classes outdoors, you should create your own QR code to enable customers to check-in to each class.
- Customers can check in to your venue or class by scanning the code using their phone camera.
- As an organiser you should keep a separate log of attendees for each class or event and keep this for 21 days.

There are exceptions where groups can be larger than 6 people with social distancing measures in place : These include: exercise classes, organised outdoor sport or licensed outdoor physical activity, and supervised sporting activity (indoors or outdoors).

ENFORD PARISH COUNCIL Draft Minutes Abridged Draft Minutes of the meeting of 13th October 2020 Held in the Village Hall

20/074 Police Matters and Neighbourhood Watch

The September Police Report had been requested but had not been received. Cllr Clark who has taken on the Police and Neighbourhood Watch representation for the Parish Council, reported a call from a previous NHW member/liaison who does not have internet access and a discussion was had on the merits of re-establishing a network of people across the different areas of the Parish who might report incidents in their area, as against the evolved current system of anyone reporting an incident direct to the Police when it happened. The new NHW website is now open to everyone. The point was raised that not everyone has a computer or internet access and they rely on an NHW liaison as before. Cllr Roberts explained that some years ago NHW ran adverts in the Newsletter to recruit more people but there were no responses. Cllr Coulthard suggested running such advertisements again so as to share the responsibility held by Cllr Clark. There are now more ways to report crime or suspicious behaviour for example through Landmarc, PlainWatch, Police 999 or 101 etc

Cllr Roberts reported that at the latest Area Board Meeting it was announced that there would be a new Police Station built in Tidworth(ready in 2023), there are 41 more Police Officers in Wiltshire and 226 pandemic penalty notices had been issued in the area. 20/076 Unitary Council Matters

WCllr Ian Blair-Pilling wanted to highlight a few points he felt were worth noting. Following an aggressive rant caught on video received from the Speedwatch team, he is talking to the MoD about the unacceptable behaviour of a person in identifiable uniform. His car registration number also appears on the video.

ii. Leisure centres across Wiltshire continue to open with safety restrictions in place and some Libraries will start to open from 20th.

iii. In a briefing from the Public Health Officer for Wiltshire (from the WC Cabinet) it is confirmed that Wiltshire has some of the lowest numbers of infection in the country. Wiltshire Track and Trace are reaching 80% of people involved. 18 schools have been disrupted by the virus (a total of 590 children), it is thought these are house-to-house transfers as there are no recorded hot-spots in the county. WC are saying 'no' to Wardens or Marshalls and are leaving matters up to the Police to deal with. There has been good compliance in the county.

iv. Financially WC's situation is looking better now with approximately £5 million of reserves being used. Although the collection and refund rate over the next three years is unknown making it difficult to balance the budget, WC is doing alright and they have more confidence in their predictions.

Cllr Coulthard asked WCllr Blair-Pilling about the recent CATG meeting as he was unable to log into it. The relevant item was whether or not the CATG had made a decision on funding for the potential limiting of speed through Enford. It had been discussed and agreed that funding would be available and a report is hoped for by January 2021.

20/079 Matters Arising

i Parish Council website – All ClIrs had received a copy of the proposal/quotation from Eyelid Productions to supply and host the Parish Council only website. ClIr Clark proposed it was accepted and ClIr Coulthard seconded the proposal with all other ClIrs agreeing.

ii 1696 Enford warrant. The Village Hall have confirmed that they would be happy to display the Warrant. Cllr Roberts has been in touch with the Wiltshire History centre who would be happy to store the original document. There would be a small charge (£10-20) to provide us with a stick from which we could then make prints. Wessex Print in Pewsey have said they could then print on to 260g off-white linen 'card' or a Conqueror 300g paper in either light oyster or cream. It was agreed that an off-white linen card should be used and also the cost of a suitable frame (circa £50-£80) before presenting it to the Village Hall for display. Further copies could be taken from the stick as required.

iii Due to the theft of the masks and the money box from the Bus Shelter, the new 'mask shop' has been relocated to Jane Young's garage. This has been a very successful venture raising over £6,000 in total (between Enford and Netheravon) and a further £1,000 plus has been raised by the limited edition 'Poppy' masks which have now sold out.

iv Remembrance. The latest reports suggest that a full Remembrance Service will go ahead on Sunday 8th November. It was suggested that the main mask makers, Ramona, Shona and Sharon be invited to lay the wreath. If they are unable to do so Cllr Pat Holdway offered to take the honour. Cllr Waight asked about putting up the Enford Poppies around the Village and offered to help do this. Cllr Roberts will gather more assistance from others nearer the time.

v Christmas tree. Whilst this is a little ahead of schedule it was agreed to go ahead with the purchase of a similar sized Christmas tree to be put up in the first week of December. Due to the miseries of the year it was suggested that more should be made of the 'tree and lights' arrival – a mince pies and mulled wine celebration by the tree (socially

distanced) with children making decorations, the winner of whom would then turn on the lights. The suggested date being Friday 11th December - see November's Newsletter for exact details. 20/080 Resident's issues Raised.

i Rubbish on roadside at New Buildings. This has now been cleared.

ii The Old Mink Farm site. This has raised many potential issues with rumours of someone living on site, a stray (nuisance) flock of geese wandering the valley and an Application to the Govt for a Goods Vehicle Operators Licence for two vehicles. Both Netheravon and Enford Parish Council have been in touch with Wiltshire Council. Since the application for a Traveller site was refused on Highways safety issues, there should be no-one living on the site. It has been 'tidied'and some rubbish removed, re-fenced and some animals are being kept. WC's Enforcement team have "visited the site on several occasions over the last couple of months in order to investigate concerns of people living at the site, along with other potentially unauthorised development taking place. It was noted during these visits that a new mobile home had been placed on the land and that additional hardstanding had been laid. In order to progress the Enforcement file. a Planning Contravention Notice(PCN) was served on the site on Thursday 24th September". A notice in the Salisbury Journal for an application for a Goods Vehicle Operators Licence for two vehicles operating from the sight has been spotted. The licences do not come from WC but from central Govt who do not know the area. It is proposed and agreed that a letter of objection be sent to the Licence issuer by the Parish Council as the entrance to the site has not changed and would be as dangerous as the movement of Traveller caravans etc on and off the A345.

20/083 New Playpark

With the previous approval to get quotations to re-fence the Playpark area, Cllr Young had approached the Enford Community Fund. In principal a contribution from them could assist with the final cost. The Fencer's quotation was received only today (Tuesday 13^{th} Sept) at a cost of £3,877.90. Due to the cost which was higher than expected, a discussion was had as to whether some parts (in reasonable condition) could be retained. Cllr Waight said he would take a look and see what could be done. Cllr Young also reported problems with the bin attached to the fence. She has been emptying this herself for years. It is an awkward size to get bags for and as there is no lid, it also fills with water when it rains. This means a delay in emptying as it also needs to be drained. The Clerk was asked to source a more suitable bin.

20/084 Parish Hall

Cllr Cliffe-Roberts was unable to attend but reported that he was still waiting to hear from WC on his pre-Application. WCllr Blair-Pilling will assist with trying to speed up this process.

20/085 Roads and Highways

Cllr Coulthard reported that Gabriel, the Parish Steward, has sorted out the pothole outside Mr Heroys house. He is able to sort minor potholes on the minor roads so please keep reports coming in to get them dealt with. He also asked who was responsible for the East to West Chisenbury bridge which is requiring attention. Cllr Roberts reported the bent sign at the top of B1 crossing.

It is located in the centre of Enford 25m north of The Swan next to the parish notice boards.

If you think you need to use the defibrillator call 999. The Emergency Service will give you the code to get into the cabinet.

The tall trees danced in the wind, waving their branches side to side. The bright delicate flowers watch the world go by whilst the birds are flying across the sky. The crickets jump high amongst the deadly stinging nettles. In the clear blue sky a glider skims across the clouds. Hay bales are piled up like a castle in a beautiful field of wild flowers. You can smell the flowers and feel the cold air touching your back.

Big green hills are everywhere as if leading to another world. Buzzards are flying in the sky hunting down the poor innocent little brown field mice.

You can hear the crickets laughing to one another with their chirps.

In the distance you can see a city of trees, right in the middle is a track leading you to somewhere.

The long green grass blows in the wind's direction.

When it's night, the stars are flashlights in the sky, lighting up the dark spooky night. Trees look like tall giants, standing, watching their surroundings. The bats come out of their hiding place and flood the sky, darting place to place to find their supper for the evening.

Then it comes to morning, the sun wakes up and comes above the tall green hills waking up all the people in the village below.

Down a muddy track, behind a fence live two muddy pink pigs, scoffing down anything they can smell or see.

In the village, you see beautiful houses with thatch roofs looking down towards the rushing river that is home to elegant swans and scaly fishes. You can hear the woodpecker pecking at the wood making a home for him and his family.

You can hear children of all different ages paddling and swimming in the river. Three ducks fly and land in the river. Quack the ducks went. The strong stream pushes the three ducks to the other side of the riverbank.

Gardening Tips from Tony Archer at Superior Plants

Here at Superior Plants we are coming to the end of the planting season and getting ready to welcome our Christmas Trees onto the nursery. The nights are dark and the summer seems like a lifetime ago. What can we do in the garden?

Coming into the colder months of the year there are still lots of things that can be done on a crisp and cold day which will set you up for the coming year.

- Take all of the old leaves off of your Hellebores now, the old leaves can attract black spot and by taking the old leaves off you are reducing the chance of disease and encouraging the plant to re-produce. This means loads of fresh flowers from December onwards and don't worry the new leaves will come in the spring. You will get a much better display by removing the old leaves.
- Rhubarb loves the cold, if it is not really performing then dig it up and check for Vine Weevil larvae which eat the roots. Then just chuck it on top of the ground and let the frost really get into the root through the winter, plant it again in the spring in a nicely dug spot with lots of well-rotted compost and BOOM! It will be like a teenager again....
- If it's raining then why not build an insect hotel? All you need is a few canes cut into short lengths a few cones and some sticks, put them in a box with both sides open and leave it in the greenhouse and this will provide a safe home for beneficial insects which will benefit you in the spring.
- Make sure that Geraniums, Dahlias and Begonia corms are now inside and dry away from the cold, give the geraniums a well ventilated area and remember to give them a little water (not too much) but no feed through the winter.
- Protect soft plants like Banana plants by wrapping them with fleece and they will thank you again in the spring with a fresh new growth to enjoy.
- Plant pots with Pansies, Violas, Ivy, Thyme, Rosemary, Hebe, Conifer, and bulbs which will give you some colour through the winter and bulbs will pop up when you most need some colour in your life.
- Wash all your pots and trays and leave them in a warm sunny spot, we use Jeyes Fluid which is cheap and does a good job of cleaning and sterilising the pots and trays for the coming year
- Most important enjoy the garden in the winter, it is amazing how you can waste an hour or so just pottering in the garden. It's good for the soul.

A Taste of South America Episode 7 - From Peru to Bolivia

The next day we set out by public bus to Desaguadero, the border separating Peru and Bolivia and where we bid a sad farewell to our wonderful guide Desi. After clearing border control, our luggage checked we boarded back on the bus to continue our journey on to La Paz, Boliva.



Wow La Paz! I don't think we have ever entered a city which has left such an impression. La Paz is located in a steep canyon, surrounded by snow peaked mountains and dramatic land formations carved by giant, melted ice glaciers. The city centre, Plaza Murillo is located at 3636m above sea level, some 400m below the altiplano with and the sprawling city of El Alto perched precariously above this on the canyons rim. La Paz has a population of 1.3 million a scene quite easy to see with the vast expanse of buildings, houses, apartments stretching for miles. To accommodate this number of residents, and those in the surrounding cities including El Alto with a population of

1.2 million. The steep canyon sides and cities are joined by a network of 10 cable car systems. Fantastic, something more cities/countries should adopt to help with growing populations, reducing emissions and enabling quicker and easier access for all. The cable cars are also a great way to see the city and give you that awe-inspiring view of the cast city below and surrounding countryside.

Our first full day in La Paz we moved hotels, out to a quieter more residential area. A decision we made before we left in view that after spending a month travelling with others we may want some time on our together. This is now turned out to be our honeymoon after all (I still feel cheated about that!)

The next day we took a challenge only one side of the family knew we were contemplating doing, cycling the death road. I wasn't going to let my family in on that secret, especially knowing how accident prone I am! What an adventure it was and one we can both safely say done that, got the t-shirt! The death road was built in 1930 linking La Paz to the Yungas region. This infamous narrow dirt road is cut precariously into



the side of the mountain and descends 2,000m (6,500 feet). With 1,000m+ (3,300 feet) sheer drops, rock overhangs and cascading waterfalls. Because of the lack of guardrails, rain, and fog, the road was considered dangerous, claiming more than 300 lives per year. Nowadays the road is used mostly by tourists, completing the 64 km long road, 3500 m descent by bike. Kitted out with our bikes, helmet, gloves and clothes we were ready to accept the challenge! The journey started with an hour's drive to La Cumbre (4,700m/15,400 ft), with views of snow-covered peaks, including Huayna Potosí (6.088m/19.973 ft). After a safety briefing and ritual of tipping sugar cane alcohol on the road, bike wheel, taking a small sip and asking Patchama to look after us we set off for a 22km downhill ride on asphalt, the first part being on the new road built to replace the death road. My only complaint about this section was my bike didn't go fast enough! We then had an optional 10km of 'undulating' road to the start of death road. The sensible ones chose the scenic option in the van, Dallas rode! Now it was time for safety briefing #2. We now had to ride on the left side of the road, ledge side, giving way to oncoming traffic coming up the death road. This is the rule of the road because those driving mountain edge can then gauge and position their wheels as close to the edge as safely possible! There was an exception to this when cycling past waterfalls, landslides and narrow strips of road where there are no safety barriers! Not that safety barriers were a common theme!

The ride was great, hairy at times due to the loose gravel, tight corners and larger rocks in the road to avoid, affectionately termed 'baby's head' due to their size! The views were amazing, surrounded by steep lush green mountains, the road snaking down in front and finally in the distance to a small town nestled amongst the trees. Our ride came to an end at

Yosola (1,100m/3,600) where we had lunch at a wildlife rehabilitation centre, joined at the table by a baby monkey. We then took the 3hr ride back to La Paz via the new death road, much less hair raising and safer then the original road!

We had another free day in La Paz before the start of final adventure our 'Bolivian highlights tour'. We spent this time just relaxing, soaking up the sights and sounds of the city, riding the cable cars to once again be mesmerised by this vast magnificent city stretching out below us. We also spent one afternoon doing a food with altitude tour. This took us round several local markets where we got to savour some local cuisine. We tasted two soups, sopa de mani, peanut and potato and chairo, a local soup made with rehydrated potato, beans, peas, local herbs, pork and crackling. Delicious. We had deep fried karachi and mauri 2 types of fish found and caught from lake Titicaca (40% of lake Titicaca is in Bolivia, 60% Peru). Our tour also included eating fruit salad and tasting some of Bolivia's finest chocolate, again delicious.

During the tour we also wandered the streets and through the local cemetery. As odd as this may seem it was an amazing sight. The cemetery is located in the heart of the city, cable car running above. Graves are stacked horizontally, up to 5 high and stretch in rows 30m long. Each grave can be hired for up to 15yrs. The coffin sits behind a front window, sometimes glass enclosed and decorated with pictures, photos, flowers. Offerings of food, drink, coca leaves, anything friends or family wish to leave and favoured by the deceased. We visited a few days after mothers' day where grave fronts also contained small musical boxes, filling the air with faint, musical tunes. A sad but touching gesture. Catholicism is the main religion in Bolivia, with many holding strong beliefs in reincarnation., one's soul being released and continued in a new after life.



We also visited the local cocoa museum. An interesting insight to its history, uses, benefits and cultural importance. A traditional that continues daily with many chewing coca leaves and drinking tea to help with altitude sickness and assist with working long shifts!

Now the start of our Bolivia adventure begins. We have a new group of 6 completing this trip with us: 1 Brit, 1 Kiwi, 3 Aussies and our good friend Adrienne, a Canadian, who we had the pleasure of meeting and travelling through southern India with and has joined us for this trip. Super great to see her - a fellow nurse who one day I hope to find myself working and travelling with, possibly on a mercy ship - my turn to earn some pennies whilst Dallas plays handyman or pool boy! Our journey started with a bus trip from La Paz to Uyuni, in southwest Bolivia. Uyuni is home to the world's largest salt flats and for what would be the start of our 3 day 4-wheel drive into Salar de Uynui and the Andean dessert and salt flats.

Setting off in 2 vehicles and joined by an Australian couple, we first headed to the train cemetery. A backdrop of old, disused trains, carriages, engines and old cargo trailers, rusting in the salty plains. A spectacle to photograph and an adventure playground to climb around. Next stop was at a local salt packaging plant. I use the word plant in the loosest of terms! A back yard with three ground chimneys on top of which the salt is dried, then put through a hand machine to be crushed, iodine added an then finally a lady bags by hand, then seals the bag on an open flame with a hot iron rod! We then headed off into the salt plain. A bizarre sight of bright dazzling white and what looks as if it's snow or ice covering for miles. It may not have been snow but believe me it certainly felt like it, freezing cold, ice cream headache in the toes!



Our first mission was off to find some water to capture the surrounding mountain scenery, perfectly reflected in the water below.

The first night's accommodation was salt hotel, a homestay made entirely from salt. Salt blocks for walls, carved to form benches, bedframes and granulated salt creating a rather crunchy, unique floor. Very cool and somewhere we are never likely to experience staying again. Our next day took us further into the salts...(sorry - that's next month! Ed.)

We hope, for example, to keep the Crimestoppers logo and contact details constantly in the public eye through regular placements in publications such as these.

Finally, as a volunteer Committee we are always looking for people to help our cause and kindly give us their time to make our communities safer; if you know of anyone who may be interested please do let me know.
