What's Your Favourite...?

Last month we asked what your favourite walks were....

"A ramble through Woodhenge and then along the variety of paths between and across the fields, passing tumuli and other prehistoric items of interest, to Stonehenge filled a few of my afternoons. It was a privilege to get so close to Stonehenge (literally the other side of the boundary fence) when there was no-one else around."

"Turn right out of the Woodborough Garden Centre and take the first footpath on the right that goes along the back of the garden centre, across fields to the main road. Carry on till you see the Swanborough Tump plaque on your right and walk down the drive to Cocklebury Farm. Cross the Kennet & Avon Canal and turn left along the canal path. Cross back over the canal at the next bridge and back into Woodborough and to the Garden Centre."

"I have discovered an excellent range of local walking maps at the White Horse Bookshop in Marlborough. Published by Yellow Publications Ltd., look for The Yellow Walk Maps with a scale of 1:16000, part of the OS Explorer range. I think they were £2.99 each. I have "Around & About Vale of Pewsey" and "Around & About Marlborough & Savernake Forest". The scale is wonderfully large, printed on water-resistant paper in a concertina format and they're really easy to follow. Small enough for your pocket and fully opened up they measure 32x47cm. Plenty more areas available, e.g. Upavon shop sells the "Around & About Upavon" edition. I have found masses of new walks, even around an area I thought I knew really well. Highly recommended."

WELCOME BACK! Update 21st May 2021

The Village Hall re-opened on 17th May and the Committee is looking forward to welcoming everyone back for Meetings, Classes and Clubs, both indoors and outside. According to the Government's "Four Step Road Map" parties and private events will be permitted to take place from 21st June.

It is hoped that during the summer holidays there will be a children's activities programme at the Village Hall and Recreation Ground run by Wild Life Day Camps www.wild-lifecamps.co.uk Activities are being planned from Monday 26 July to Friday 20 August and are designed for children from age 4 to 12. Over the past year the Committee has taken advantage of the closures to carry out an extensive programme of deep cleaning, maintenance and repairs. The main hall area was also re-decorated in March, maintenance is still on-going and the Hall is in good condition. It has been similar to working on the Firth of Forth Bridge; as soon as everything on the list has been ticked off, something else crops up!

The main project carried out this winter was the removal of dead Elm and Ash trees along the northern boundary of the car park. The trees had become unstable posing a potential risk to riders, walkers and users of the Hall. The stumps and roots were then ground out and the area is now being cleared ready for re-planting in the autumn. Details have not yet been finalised but in outline a mixed native hedge will be planted with some new tree saplings. A grant application has been made to the Woodland Trust and the Gardening Club has offered to help with the work.

The Hall is fully Covid compliant and, similar to the last couple of times when the Hall was allowed to open (albeit with some restrictions) users are asked to help by following all the basic guidelines for social distancing and hygiene. Please check with the relevant club organisers and class teachers as to when they are planning to return or if they have set up alternative arrangements online.

GARDENING TIPS FOR JUNE

Hopefully, we'll all be basking in the sunshine and enjoying the fruits of our labours over the past months. Roses, clematis, philadelphus, geraniums, hostas - just some of the many wonderful flowers which should be in full flower this month. Always something to do in the garden though!

LAWNS: Mow regularly and feed the grass with liquid lawn feed if it needs greening up

SHRUBS & CLIMBERS: Propagate shrubs & roses by taking softwood cuttings.

Prune Clematis montana if necessary

Clip privet and other fast growing hedges

FLOWERS: Dig up tulips and hyacinths when the foliage dies and store the dry bulbs for autumn planting.

Plant up your summer bedding plus pots and hanging baskets now (fingers crossed no more frost!)

Deadhead after flowering

Keep everything well watered

VEGETABLES: Sow salads, courgettes, squashes, French & runner beans, carrots, sweetcorn

GREENHOUSE: Water and feed plants regularly.

Pot up rooted cuttings and pot on when roots are showing at the bottom of the pot.

Pinch out the side shoots of tomatoes, feed once a week.

But, most importantly, take time to sit and enjoy the garden. This is the month to consider what is working and what isn't, and make a plan for next year. Let's hope we all have a lovely sunny month!

The Flow and Ebb of a River part 2

This second half of the essay covers from the arrival of the canals and railway up to 1995, when it was written.

The river was the highway to the world but the city was badly situated to get the goods it brought out to the rest of the country. The nearest crossing of the Mersey was at Warrington, but the ground between the two towns was marshy and goods had to go by pack-horse. It was decided in the mid-



eighteenth century to borrow the Dutch idea of canals. Small stretches of waterways were constructed at first, culminating in the Leeds-Liverpool canal in the 1770s. So, the Mersey was now connected to the North and South of England and from its own bed to the Humber. Cotton became the chief import and a way had to be found to get it from Liverpool to Manchester quickly and Stephenson came along with his railway. He had two problems. First, the marshy ground between Warrington and Manchester, Chat Moss. He solved this problem

by floating hurdles as a foundation for this part of the track. His other problem was the mile or so of track from Edge Hill to the city centre, Lime Street. Tunnels had to be cut through the thick, high limestone outcrop between the two stations.

The tunnels and cuttings are still used today and the round ventilating towers can still be seen in the streets of Edge Hill today.

The river treated its merchants well. The cotton barons built mansions in large grounds on the outskirts of the city. Most of these still stand and the grounds are public parks. The smaller merchants built long, high terraces around squares nearer to the city centre. The prosperous tradesmen of ancillary trades lived in terraces with walled gardens and carried on their businesses at the rear of their premises. Their houses were large and many still stand today. The city liked to ape the capital and has more streets named after London thoroughfares than any other English city – Islington, Kensington, Paddington to name but three. Many of its streets reflect its mercantile background – Commutation Row, Oil Street, Corn Street.

But the poor were poor. Housing was bad and the problems increased when the river brought in the starving white human cargo from the Liffey, driven out of Ireland by rotten potatoes. But the city tried. Open sewers were filled in. water was brought in metal pipes from Wales, tenements were built. Liverpool had the first public wash-houses in Britain, attached to public baths. Even after the advent of launderettes, women could still be seen pushing their pram-loads of laundry to and from the wash-houses. It was a way of life for them and cheaper than the launderette.

Until the opening of the Royal Infirmary in the 1970s, the city had twelve specialist hospitals, plus the School of Tropical Medicine, the first in England.



Many of the children lived on the streets in the nineteenth century. They sold matches and pamphlets amongst other things. One group were known as "The Newsboys". A special house was built for them, The Newsboys Hall, so at least they had somewhere to sleep. A Cathoilc priest, Father Nugent, did a lot to relieve the children's suffering. His statue with a child stands behind St. George's Hall.

So, the ten miles of docks grew from the coal and oil jetties of the Dingle to the Bootle Docks. From 1946 the river was full of shipping from the bustling little dredgers to the ocean-going liners, from the three Mersey Ferries to the little red fire-tender. The river, oily and grey, gazed up at



the three famous buildings of its waterfront and was pleased with its lot. It lapped greasily around its floating landing stage where sometimes, one walked uphill to join the ferry and sometimes down, depending on the height of the tide. It was proud of the little gold crown over the gangway awning of the ferry which told the world that the river is the Queens' highway and a crossing must always be available to her subjects. Only one ferry runs through the night now, but the day crossings are well used by commuters. There is little shipping now except yachts on the marina and the Irish ferry boats – even the Isle of Man ferry has deserted in for Morecambe Bay.

The ships bringing sugar and tobacco to feed the factories of Tate and Lyle, Barker and Dobson and Ogdens no longer do so. The factories are gone, as are the jobs of the families who worked there, sometimes three generations at one time. The sugar factory became obsolete, closed, was demolished and not rebuilt. Tobacco is bad for our health and there was no local sugar to make Everton Toffees. So the people became obsolete too. Containers, pallets and fork-lifts replaced the bill hooks and the crates and the stevedores.



On a sunny day, walk along the Otterspool Promenade with its lawns and gardens, built on the Cast Iron Shore, as it used to be called before the gardens were built on it. The Mersey's waters are blue and its mud-banks at low tide are golden sand, and the green hills of Helsby and Frodsham gleam clearly on the Cheshire side. All very pleasant for a

leisurely afternoon's relaxation and in its retirement that is about all the proud river can give its city now.

THE AUNT'S FRUIT CAKE

<u>INGREDIENTS</u>

15oz/432g tin of crushed pineapple (if you cannot find crushed then just pulp a tin of sliced) and discard half the juice

4oz /100g margarine

12oz /350g mixed dried fruit

4oz/100g glace cherries

8oz/225g granulated sugar

1 teaspoon of bicarbonate of soda

2 eggs, whisked

4oz /100g self raising flour

METHOD

- 1. Put the crushed pineapple, margarine, mixed dried fruit, glace cherries and sugar into a saucepan and bring to the boil. Simmer for 15 minutes.
- 2. Remove from the heat and add the bicarbonate of soda. Stir well
- 3. Allow to cool.
- 4. Beat in the whisked eggs, stir well and then fold in the floor
- 5. Put the mixture into a greased and lined 8inch cake tin or 2lb loaf tin.
- 6. Bake at 150c/300F or Gas mark 2 for about 1 hour and 20 minutes
- 7. Leave in tin for 15 minutes then turn out on to a rack to cool!

Enjoy .. fabulously moist cake and totally delicious!

ENFORD PARISH COUNCIL

Due to the absence of draft Minutes available in this issue and in light of recent elections, I thought it might be of interest to describe in more detail what the Parish Council does for everyone. It is very easy to accept things happening around your everyday life but have you stopped and wondered who does it? Remembrance Sunday for example – where did all the poppies come from bearing the names of those from Enford who gave their lives in two World Wars? Who puts them up each year and takes them down and stores them? Where does the annual wreath come from? Where do the Christmas tree and lights come from? Who puts them up, maintains them and takes them down? Where did the defibrillator come from and who maintains it? Who keeps the Memorial Garden and Playpark tidy and accessible? Who supplies the litter bins and rubbish bins and who empties them and fills them respectively?

Draft Minutes:

Unfortunately, due to the change of date for the Parish Council AGM and the Annual Parish Meeting (from 11th to 25th May), there are no Draft Minutes available for publishing before the Newsletter's print deadline for the June issue. However by the time you read this notice both sets of draft Minutes should be available on the Parish Council Website – www.enfordparishcouncil.gov.uk – so you can read them in full. Normally the Annual Parish Meeting draft Minutes extend to too many pages to fit on the village Notices boards so most probably the Parish Council AGM draft Minutes will be there on their own.

Annual Accounts, advance notice:

As I'm sure you are aware, the Parish Council is a public body of local Government. It therefore has to follow all transparency and accountability compliance in public office. To this end the Clerk, who is also the Responsible Financial Officer of the Council is required to produce the annual accounts to audit level to be checked internally (independently) and externally by an audit firm in London. The accounting year runs from 1st April to 31st March. As part of the compliance in a public role, the Parish Accounts are available for anyone wishing to view them by prior appointment with the Clerk. The official 'Notice of Public Rights and Publication of Annual Governance & Accountability Return' will be placed on the notice boards on Friday 11th June with the period for inspection running from Monday 14th June until Friday 23rd July. If you wish to view the accounts during this period, please contact the Clerk (email: clerk@enforparishcouncil.gov.uk or tel: 01980 670034).

The Councillors:

Enford Parish is divided into two 'Wards' – North and South. The north ward consists of East Chisenbury and West Chisenbury and should be represented by 3 Councillors. The south ward consists of Compton, Coombe, Enford, Fifield, Littlecott, Longstreet, New Buildings and Newtown. After the recent elections, all Councillors who put forward their nominations were re-elected and it is hoped they will continue with their 'Representations' on the Council when voting takes place at the AGM on 25th May. Councillors give their time and efforts voluntarily to try and make the Parish a better place for everyone to live in. If you have any matter you wish to raise with the Parish Council, you should in the first instance contact the Clerk (email: clerk@enforparishcouncil.gov.uk or tel: 01980 670034). It is the Clerk's job to re-direct queries/information to the relevant Councillor(s) for actioning. If the issue needs discussion, the topic will be raised at the next Council meeting for discussion. At this point you are welcome to attend the meeting to raise the matter formally during 'Public Questions'. The only occasion where this rule is different is in the reporting

fly-tipping, potholes, overgrown verges, streetlights not working, blocked drains/culverts etc which can be reported to WC via the MyWiltshire app although some tasks can be undertaken by the Parish Steward. The Council representative for 'Highways/Transport' handles all such work and liaises with the Parish Steward as well as Wiltshire Council for major highways problems.

Other representative roles on the Parish Council are:

<u>Public Rights of Way</u> – This is for the maintenance and clearing of overgrown footpaths and bridleways throughout the Parish.

<u>Head of Planning</u> – In actual fact, all Councillors are on the 'Parish Planning' committee however our current 'Head of Planning' just so happens to be a highly qualified Chartered Surveyor which is most helpful on complex Planning Applications.

<u>Village Amenities</u> - This role covers not just the Playpark area but also Youth representation.

<u>Village Hall</u> – This role keeps the Parish Council up to date with events and issues at the Village Hall.

<u>Police Liaison & Neighbourhood Watch</u> – This representation deals with both Neighbourhood Watch issues and also any Policing issues that may occur – possibly attending Police meetings if the situation warrants it.

Highways and Transport - see above.

<u>Flood Warden</u> – This role liaises with Wiltshire Council, Wessex Water and the Environment Agency and ensures that the Parish has enough flood precautions – sandbags etc. when the need arises.

The Parish Council also handles the salt and grit supplies for the Parish, ensuring the bins provided are in good repair, fully stocked and prepared for bad weather. On similar lines, the Council has an Emergency Plan for freezing conditions, flooding and all other extremes. All the litter bins (dog waste bins) are supplied where needed by the Parish Council and they hold the contract for them to be emptied on a regular basis. It is Parish Councillors who make up the working parties for events like Playpark maintenance.

The Parish Council also liaises with the Ministry of Defence Safety Officers and share information and incidents relating particularly to the Parish.

The Annual Litter Pick is something else organised by the Parish Council. Not only does everyone benefit from a cleaner parish but it is a family/community event bringing people together and rounding off your efforts with 'Refreshments' and a bit of a 'social'. This year we are hoping to proceed with the Litter Pick on Saturday 26th June, 10.30 to 12.30. Nothing can be finalised as yet because restrictions are still in place but it is hoped that these will be removed before then. Further notices of this event will be forthcoming nearer the time.

Following the recent Boundary changes within Wiltshire, Enford Parish will be moving from the Tidworth Area Board to the Avon Valley and Amesbury Area Board immediately after the election. This should not have any effect on the way the Parish Councils runs its business.

The Parish Council would like to thank all those residents who have done and continue to volunteer their time in assisting with ongoing projects such as Speedwatch, maintaining the Speed Indicator Device, clearing paths etc.
